Cogeneration

Of all of Europe's tools for improving energy efficiency and reducing CO₂ emissions cogeneration is one of the lowest risk and most far reaching in near term impact. Eleven percent of Europe's electricity today is produced using this proven energy efficiency technology and an estimated additional 150 GWe of European cogeneration potential remains to be exploited.

Specifically highlighted as a key energy efficiency technology in the second European Strategic Energy review (November 2008), cogeneration has European Union support for growth: it is a strategic energy choice for Europe.

Conference

In 2009 the COGEN Europe Annual Conference will ask the questions: How will the sector respond to the economic downturn and how should the sector position itself to deliver the long term strategic advantage that Europe is looking for?

The two-day Conference is Europe's largest annual cogeneration event and will take place on **21-22 April in Brussels**. Executive level representatives from all stakeholder groups including financiers, equipment manufacturers, technical experts, academics and many of the sectors which use cogeneration, will take part. The conference will show best practise across the full range of cogeneration applications from industry and commercial, domestic and district heating, and experts from all sectors will give their response to the challenges of developing the market.

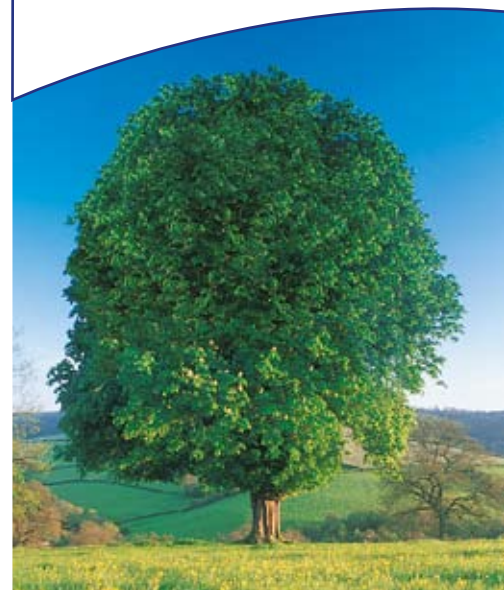
